#### Arthur Lawrence Bolton NM6K.

Arthur "Art" Bolton, 96, a 50 year resident of Menlo Park, died April 23.

Born in Berkeley Calif., on Oct. 30, 1906, he received his bachelor's degree from UC Berkeley and his master's degree from the University of Michigan. Most of his subsequent career was spent in sales, but his passion was for ham radio. At the age of 14, he passed the FCC Morse code test and received his operator license, eventually becoming Operator NM6K. A member of the Palo Alto Amateur Radio Association, he was awarded a plaque in 2001 honoring his 80-year membership.

Remembered for his lively wit, quick puns, prodigious memory and curiosity about all things mechanical, he is survived by his wife of 66 years, Dorothy Hall Bolton, an accomplished local artist.

# PAARA HONORS N6PGM

# WHO IS YOGALILY?

I cannot think of any other person at this time that deserves this long overdue recognition for the services that she provided our club over the years.

I am of course referring to the only lady President that we have ever had guiding our club activities and administering

the growth and well-being of PAARA. Please congratulate our very own LILY ANNE HILLIS, N6PGM.

She was the PAARA President in 1993 and 1994. She served as the PAARA Treasurer in 1988, 1989, 1990, 1991, 1992 and 1993. She also trained the new Treasurer throughout 1994. She was also the EC for Menlo Park and Atherton area for six years.

This writer has had the pleasure of knowing Lily since the early eighties and I must tell you that she is a real ball of fire when it comes to administering and arranging things in general and club events in particular. Lily is a lady in the truest sense of the word.

Lily Anne Hillis was born in St. Louis, Mis-

souri, on May 21, 1937. That was the same year the PAARA was organized. Her grandparents had emigrated from Germany in the late 1800's, so both of her parents were born in the United States. Lily's father was a real estate developer in the St. Louis area and her mom was a homemaker. Her only brother is still in the real estate development business in the St. Louis area. Lily completed all of her schooling in St. Louis and learned a lot about horses as

her parents owned several American Saddle bred horses. Lily became an accomplished horse rider and was a nationally recognized American Saddle bred horsewoman who showed these horses on a regular basis through the high school years.

Lily graduated high school in St. Louis in 1955 at 18 years of age. She really enjoyed the Al Jolson songs: 'California Here I Come,' and 'Golden Gate'. She had developed a fantasy about moving to California and living there. She also learned that Stanford University had no sororities, only fraternities, on campus. This appealed to her as well since she did not want to be subjected to the often times unusual activities and embarrassment of a sorority. Plus, she was rather tired of the cold weather and snow in Missouri.

In September of 1955, Lily was accepted at Stanford University and moved to the Palo Alto area, where she lived on campus for the next four years. During her last two years at

University, Lily became a regular attendee at the Officers Club at the Moffett Naval Air Station and had the opportunity of meeting and socializing with many of the finest Naval Aviator Officers of the time. She even took one home to meet Mom and Dad during a vacation period and found that all of her girlfriends were amazed and jealous.


Lily graduated with a BA in Philosophy from Stanford University in June 1959.

In September 1959 she married the assistant baseball coach at Stanford. He earned his Master's Degree in Education from Stanford and had played semi-pro baseball for a period of time. They lived in a small apartment in Palo Alto. Lily points out that like many young

women who grew up during that time, she had been programmed to, 'get married and have a family.'

They moved to Portland, Oregon, for a short period of time during 1960 as her new husband had taken a job there. However, they returned to Palo Alto after six months so he could explore new employment opportunities. In August 1960, a daughter, Jacqueline was born and in October, 1963, a son, James became the newest member of their




The brakes have been serviced, the front axel wheels and tires have been replaced, the low voltage electrical system has been repaired and a lockable opening has been created in the rear so that the two antenna towers can be stored and transported. 

family. They purchased a home in Menlo Park in 1961. Lily is still living in this house, 42 years later. She really enjoys the area, the weather and all of her friends and associates. Today, Jacqueline has a Master's Degree in Geology and works for the FAA in Anchorage, Alaska. James lives with his French wife in Lexington, Kentucky, where they own a bakery and specialize in fancy, artistic wedding cakes for the rich and famous of that area.

Lily was divorced in 1969 and soon became a licensed real estate agent who specialized in high-end properties in the Palo Alto and Menlo Park region. She re-married during that time, however it lasted less than two years.

During the early 60's, Lily had the opportunity to take part in the legal scientific and medical experiments and studies involving the use of psychedelic, mind-altering drugs. During Lily's PAARA administration, the club was responsible for installing antennas and radios in six fire stations and the police station in Menlo Park. She has worked as the head chef at Field Day events and was actually the publisher/editor of this fine, monthly club newsletter for a short time. She has a fierce loyalty to any commitment, especially club or volunteer duties and still is active with the Chaverim Amateur Radio Club. Lily does not operate HF yet as she prefers VHF and UHF and has a complete station set up in her kitchen at home and in her vehicle.

About sixteen years ago, Lily took her first yoga class and fell in love with that activity. She became an instructor and has been offering professional yoga training classes ever since. She teaches locally at the Yoga Center of Palo Alto and provides special, private training as well as two well-

# FIELD DAY 2003

We will participate in yet another exciting Field Day this year over the weekend of June 28 and 29th. Our location will be the same as last year, up on the top of the mound at the Bayfront Park, which is located at the eastern end of Marsh Road where it intersects with Haven Ave in Menlo Park. Gerry Tucker N6NV has been busy making the necessary arrangements with the local Government authorities for the use of this community area once again. It should be noted that one of the reasons the City of Menlo Park is allowing us to use the facility again is because we cleaned it up so nicely last year. When the Park Ranger inspected the area upon our departure he did not find any garbage, tower guy wires or depressed ham operators who were curled up in a ball crying because of making so few on the air contacts. It must have been a success.

We will start moving equipment to the site at 11 AM on Friday, June 27th. The PAARA trailer's and heavy equipment like the metal antenna towers will be transported to the site by the hams who have the specialized vehicles. The portable toilet or toilets will be rented and should be on site throughout the event. Remember, we can not actually begin any operations until 11 AM on Saturday, June 28. The on the air operations will continue in earnest until 11 AM on Sunday, June 29th. Then, of course, we will need to tear down the equipment, clean up the site and transport everything back to the respective storage areas.

Sign-up sheets will be available at the PAARA meeting of June 6th to assist in determining the availability of radio operators FIELD DAY 2003.

pate. There will be lots of vehicle parking available and security is not an issue as this event is well attended by various on duty law enforcement agencies & other departments.



# **2003 OUT TO DINNER**

- 7) You should have a three digit number.
- 8) This first digit will be your original number !!! (the number of times that you would like to eat out).
- 9) The next two numbers are your age !!!


