PAARA Board of Directors News.

Our President, Andreas Junge, N6NU, has announced the appointment of Terry Finn, AF6TF, to the position of Association Secretary. Mr. Finn will serve at the discretion of the Board of Directors until the next election.

This appointment becomes effective immediately as the former Secretary, Jay Melvin, WA6SBO, has become overwhelmed by other commitments, including attending law school. The regular Board of Directors meeting was held on Monday, May 19/03 at the Round Table Pizza

location in Menlo Park as the Red Cross Offices in Palo Alto were not available that particular evening. The meeting convened at 19:55 hours.

In attendance was President Andreas Junge, N6NU; Vice President Jim Rice, K6AK; new treasurer Carol Randall, W6GEM; old treasurer Bob Korte, KD6KYT; Secretary Terry Finn, AF6TF; Board members, Gerry Tucker, N6NV; Vic Black, AB6SO; Adrianus Schrauwen, W6AJS and Association member guests; David Cooper, KE6PFF and Dave Rogers, K5DKR.

The new generator committee made up of Vic Black, AB6SO and Terry Finn, AF6TF reported that after extensive technical research and price comparisons, it was decided to purchase a new 1000-watt Honda portable generator. This unit is quiet and light in weight and only cost PAARA a total of \$629. The generator committee will formally present it to PAARA at Field Day where it will really be put to the test!! This is new technology where a DC generator provides current to a built in inverter for clean AC output capable of running even sensitive things like computers or expensive radios.

The Board decided to donate \$500 to the organization known as Handi-Hams who assist people with learning disabilities. This group has a long track record in helping new comers to the hobby learn the necessary skills to become licensed hams. This has come about due to the input from **Kitty Heyener, WBSTDA**.

Vice President Jim Rice, K6AK, provided an interesting report detailing the success of the monthly raffle at the Club meetings. This activity has netted the Club slightly more than \$500 in revenue (after expenses) since its inception. Also noted was the fact that PAARA only contributes \$50 per month to the raffle prize committee. Since February nine Club members have won radios. This month there will be three radios available in the raffle!!

Terry Finn, AF6TF, will be making arrangements with the publisher of World Radio magazine to have eight new magazine subscriptions available for the raffle. The Board authorized an expenditure of \$65 for this rather novel promotion.

The President appointed the following Club members to a new committee that will consider the type, style and cost of special awards or certificates to be presented at the annual Christmas party. Andreas Junge, N6NU; Gerry Tucker, N6NV; Jim Rice, K6AK; Terry Finn, AF6TF; David Cooper, KE6PFF; and Carol Randall, W6GEM.

Field Day is right around the corner as outlined by Gerry Tucker, N6NV. He and Andreas Junge, N6NU, will be coordinating everything and they need as many volunteers as possible to assist with the transportation, set up, and tear down of equipment. There will be several ad hoc meetings in the weeks & days prior to Field Day.

The meeting was adjourned at 21:45 hours.

The convention itself was held in a huge church in Reno, Nevada. The featured speakers included officials from the ARRL, ARES, RACES and leaders from various ham communication groups. Many States were represented, including Washington, Oregon, Arizona, Idaho and California. I did not see or meet anyone from the greater San Francisco Bay Area other than several former residents who have since retired and moved to Nevada. There were a number of excellent presentations by people representing the served agencies such as the American Red Cross; Salvation Army, VOAD, National Weather Service, etc.

The primary reason for my visit to this convention was to observe the various communication vehicles that have been developed and are operated by Clubs. The event even had an emergency communications vehicle competition with prizes available. I was attempting to pick up some ideas of what our Club might be able to do when our really old field day trailer just can't make it anymore. There were a number of rather interesting mobile communication vehicles on display.

Dear Members.





DOCTOR DUCKTAPE.

When this writer first met ANDY KORSAK, KR6DD, at a SCARES meeting in San Carlos during the late 70's, he struck me as an eccentric, mad scientist type. You really couldn't help thinking that, as you observed him all decked out in his portable radio equipment and wearing that green, plastic sunshade over his forehead. At that time in his life he was still a Canadian and was using the call VE3FZK, so I basically accepted him as just another oddball ham, like me, who was part of the classic 'brain drain' from Canada.

Since then however, I have come to admire and appreciate Andy as he is one of the brightest, friendliest, and most helpful hams that I have had the pleasure of associating with over the years. Allow me to take some of your valuable time and tell you a little bit more about our very own Andy, KR6DD.

Andrzej John Korsak was born on September 27, 1936 in Warsaw, Poland. His father, Kazimierz Korsak, was an experienced, well-educated aeronautical engineer who left Poland on a bicycle in 1939. The invading

Nazi's who were executing all military age men or well educated intellectuals at that time would have arrested Mr. Korsak senior. Kazimierz escaped through Czechoslovakia to Romania and then to England where he worked for a while in the aircraft industry. In 1941 he was able to immigrate to Canada by himself.

Andy's Mom, Barbara, was a medical Doctor who was working as an intern in Warsaw while raising Andy and his twin sister, Krystyna. She did not want to abandon her people or her Country during the war and knew that the Nazi's would basically leave her alone because she worked in the hospital. However, Barbara contracted typhus from the patients while working in the over crowded hospitals and passed away in 1945.

Krystyna, Andy's twin sister, and he, attended elementary school at first in Warsaw but when the Nazi's bombed it heavily they were moved to a village south of Warsaw. When the war ended, they lived with relatives in the small town of Zakopane in the Carpatian Mountains near the Czech border. They were taught some French by a tutor in preparation for escaping from Poland. Andy's father, Kazimierz, was in constant communication with his kids, other family members, friends and members of the Polish underground or resistance movement. As a result, he was able to arrange for

both Andy & Krystyna to be transported across the border, which had been sealed closed by the communists in 1946. With a lot of assistance, the children were provided with false passports and transportation documents indicating that they were returning to their home in France as their father had been killed during the war.

It should be noted that Andy & his sister were only ten years old at this time and had to play along with the charade, as it was rather serious business. They were coached on what to say in French if they were questioned at any of the borders that they had to cross. It was almost impossible to get out of Poland at that time due to the aggressive Soviet position on refu-

gees. The kids lay in the back of a truck with several others and traveled at night through the borders of Austria, Germany, Italy, Switzerland and France. They took a train from Calais, France, on the English Channel shore and then boarded a ferryboat to England. Then they actually rode on the 'Flying Scotsman' train to Edinborough, Scotland, from a place near the Leeds Royal Air Force Base. Prior to that they had been on an old steam locomotive train from Grimsby, a small town near London, England.

Now, just try to visualize this folks, as these kids were only ten years old and they were basically running for their lives without the direct help of their parents. Obviously it was a rather maturing experience that they will never forget. Behind the scenes however, was their father, Kazimierz, who from his new home in Canada had been instrumental in making all of the arrangements for this fantastic journey. He had been able to coordinate just about everything through the communication he kept with the relatives, friends and various other Polish immigrants who were escaping from their home country.

While living temporarily in Edinborough, Scotland, at a Polish refugee camp, both Andy and Krystyna completed several eye surgeries to repair a crossed eye defect. These surgeries were provided at no cost by a Polish surgeon who was also living in the camp. Prior to the surgery, neither Andy nor his sister had binocular vision, as their eyes were badly divergent!! Although that problem was resolved, Andy still sees with double vision to this day. He was also able to have a hernia repaired by another Doctor in the camp. He sustained the hernia during some rough housing with a friend when he was only eight years old and had suffered with this for years as his mom had been too busy treating soldiers at the Polish hospital.


In May 1947, Andy & Krystyna boarded the passenger ship, 'Aquitania' at Southampton, England and sailed for Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada. There is a Korsak family rumor that the mischievous rascal Andy actually caused the ship to be stopped in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean by plug-

ging hair pins into electrical outlets. (He had not yet learned about duct tape). Upon their arrival they took a train to Montreal, Quebec, Canada, and subsequently flew on a DC-3 aircraft operated by the then Trans-Canada Airlines all the way to Edmonton, Alberta. Their father, Kazimierz, was waiting for them at the airport, as he had not seen them for eight years. Finally, they were able to be together again and start their lives over again. What a wonderful reunion for all.

Kazimierz was working for an aircraft building company in Edmonton as an engineer. He immediately placed his kids in school where they had to learn the English language rather quickly if they were going to fit in and make it in the new world. Andy remembers always being about one year older than the other kids who were in his classes. However, he also recalls being promoted from one grade to the next in rapid succession because he was a quick learner and enjoyed the new language and environment.

In 1950, the family moved to Toronto, Ontario, Canada, where Kazimierz took a job with Avro Canada and was an engineer on the now in -famous 'Avro Arrow' military jet project. (A well-known piece of Canadian history and political struggle). Andy attended Downsview Collegiate and graduated high school in 1956. Andy had such good

grades that he was accepted on a full scholarship to the University of Toronto to study mathematics. He graduated number 3 in his class with a BA in Math in 1960. Andy stayed on campus and was accepted to the U of T Masters postgraduate program in math where he graduated in 1961. Just for those who may be interested, his Master's thesis was entitled: 'Topics in Conformal Geometry'. Andy applied to the Ph.D. math programs at MIT, Princeton and UC Berkeley. He was offered teaching assistant jobs at MIT and UC Berkeley, so he decided to move to California in September 1961. Andy worked hard at his part time teaching and research jobs while earn-

ing his Ph.D. in mathematics from UC Berkeley where he graduated in March 1966. His graduate thesis was entitled: 'Perturbed Optimal Control Problems'.

While attending UC, Andy had the good fortune to meet and fall in love with the lovely and talented Rosa who just happened to be visiting her brother who was also a student at UC. They were married in December 1963. It should be noted that Rosa could remember Andy taking her out to dinner at the UC weekend dinner events that cost fifty cents per person. Andy was pinching pennies even then!! In December 2003, they will have been married for 40 years!! They bought their home in the Emerald Hills of San Mateo County in 1972 and are still there today. Congratulations to you both!!

In April 1966 Andy went to work for SRI in Menlo Park. In those days it was known as the Stanford Research Institute. He worked as a research mathematician for ten years, but like so many other math experts, he slowly became a software engineer, whether he wanted to or not. In 1976, Andy went into private practice, so to speak, and became an independent contractor of sorts. As an experienced software engineer with a math background, he became involved in many varied projects over the years. Some of those included: embedded systems firmware; data acquisition & analysis; electronic access control; heads up display for helmet and aircraft windshield applications. He even spent time at the Warner-Robbins Air Force Base in Macon, Georgia, designing and building the most sophisticated ground control approach radar software available at the time. Prior to officially retiring from paid work in January 2002, Andy was the test engineer at the hard disk drive manufacturer known as Read-Rite in Milpitas, CA.

Andy was warned by Rich Stiebel, W6APZ, that when he retired he would become even busier than he was when he was working. Andy be-



lieves that has come to pass!! For those of us in the amateur radio community who monitor repeaters, it is rather obvious that Andy is a really busy ham who is the current OO (official observer) coordinator for the Santa Clara Valley Section. The OO operators are appointed by the ARRL section manager under the Amateur Auxiliary, Official Observer Program, which is basically an advisory function arranged by the ARRL and the FCC. Now please do not get too excited. This does not mean that Andy has become one of those big brother types, yet!! The ARRL OO's have absolutely no enforcement authority. He was appointed in January 2003, but he has been an active rabbit (also known as fox) transmitter hunter for years. If you do not know of this program or how it works, please do not hesitate to ask Andy personally when you see him at the meetings or you can check with Glenn Thomas, WB6W, who is the ARRL Section Coordination Manager for the Santa Clara Valley Section.

Andy's current project is a bay area wide repeater jammer network locator system that works with Doppler antennas and a unique software program that uses the Internet. This is a classified project involving several licensed hams that have a mission of locating, identifying and reporting the jammers or abusers. Unfortunately, I am not at liberty to discuss this project any further at this time

By the way, just for your information, Andy's twin sister Krystyna is now a traveling geriatric psychiatrist who fills in for other psychiatrists who are on leave for several weeks. Based in Oregon, she has been traveling all over the U.S. and really enjoys her work. She and Andy communicate via e-mail as she is not a ham.

It was 1954 in Toronto, Ontario, Canada, when Andy qualified for his first amateur radio license and was issued VE3DVN for Morse code on HF and voice at 30 MHz and above. It should be noted that his interest in radio was peaked while still living in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada. His father, Kazimierz, gave him a pair of earphones, fahnestock clips, some wire and a galena crystal in a holder with a 'cat whisker' connector. With some help from his father, Andy wound the wire around a depleted toilet paper roll and scratched off insulation to build his first radio receiver that included a home made sliding contactor for tuning the coil. He used to lie in bed at night listening to, 'The Great Gilbersleeve', 'Dragnet', 'The Shadow' and 'Amos and Andy', etc. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force Auxiliary, (now known as the Royal Canadian Air Cadets) and learned even more about electronics.

His first ham license expired in 1961, so in 1964 Andy returned to the offices of the Canadian Department of Communications and earned by exam the highest amateur radio license class, known as the advanced amateur radio license. He was issued call VE3FZK which he used until 1999 when he became a proud, new American citizen. At that point, he took the required FCC exams to earn his advanced class license and was issued KR6DD, which is the call sign we have all come to know and enjoy on the air. Before the FCC dropped the code speed requirement, Andy took the extra class test and passed with ease. He just wanted to do it "for the heck of it" in 2000.

When Andy arrived at SRI in 1966, they were located in an old World War II building near the civic center. He noticed the PAARA field day trailer at that location and soon became an active member of the local ham club known as PAARA. Andy has indicated that he is actually in possession of almost every single copy of our newsletter, PAARAgraphs that was ever published since 1966. He assisted with the hand cranking of the old mimeograph machine that produced the earlier versions of this fine publication. He has even suggested that when the time comes, he may donate that collection to PAARA for our archives.

Due to the efforts of Vance Wardlow, W6FLE, who was very active in the club during that time, Andy claims he was railroaded into becoming the PAARA President for one year. This was during the turbulent 60's and Andy later continued to serve PAARA as the Vice President "sidekick" for President Gerry Tucker, WA6LNV, (now N6NV), for about ten years as nobody wanted the job. Finally, Lilly Anne Hillis, N6PGM, stepped in for several years and really 'kicked butt'. She was able to delegate duties and organize things so that many other ham members could get involved in the organization. Andy really enjoyed arranging for speakers and experimenting with fast scan TV. In one of the photos, that Andy provided for this interview, is the hand cranked generator that was used for field day in the 60's. They used to use a location up in the hills known as the Valley of Paradise, located at the west end of Valparaiso. This area is now completely developed with rather expensive homes. Before the popular UHF repeaters were up and running, Andy used to experiment with fast scan TV on 440 MHz. He made video contacts as far away as Hamilton Air Force Base in Marin, San Jose and the east bay.

Andy is well known for his knowledge and use of ducktape as he claims it can be used for just about anything. However, since he has had many years of experimenting experience with this product, he warns that some brands of ducktape are partially conductive and will absorb RF energy. Constant exposure to the sun will ultimately destroy the tape and it leaves a cruddy mess. After much interrogation, Andy finally admitted that he does use regular black electrical tape now in some applications.

Andy, KR6DD, is very active with the rabbit-hunting hobby (also known as fox hunting).

He is also known to associate with other weird project builders or eccentric experimenters.




