"Shad" Shadowens. K6CZ by Terry Finn AF6TF

Wilber Lamont Shadowens. K6CZ.

Our very own K6CZ has the surname of 'Shadowens', which is rather uncommon as the Shad part is Welch, while

the Owens part originated in France. For the most part, he is referred to simply as: 'Shad'. He was born in 1922 in Carterville, southern Illinois in an area which is called little Egypt by the locals as the town of Cairo (pronounced Karo by those same locals) is located at the confluence of the Ohio and Mississippi rivers.

The small town of Carterville is located about fifty miles to the north east of Cairo in the coal mining and farming region. This geographic area was hard hit by the great depression and offered few opportunities for eager young men who lived and worked there. Shad mentioned that his first name of Wilber was given to him by his father who named him after his hero of the time, Wilbur Wright. However, the name may have been misspelled with an e instead of a u

by the Doctor who delivered him, when he filled out the birth certificate at the family home. Shad's middle name of Lamont was given to him by his parents who took a fancy to that name as it was one of the two police officers in their small town. Shad's parents were themselves only nineteen years old at that time.

As often happens, families may use the middle name more than the given first name, so Shad's full name of Lamont Wilber Shadowens appears on his Passport and licenses. In high school he was known as 'Shadow', not to be confused with Lamont Cranston in the fictional radio story series known at the time as, 'the shadow'. Later in life it was shortened to Shad.

Around the time of his fifth birthday, Shad was fascinated by a flight over head of his home of an enormous dirigible, popular then, at low altitude which seemed to fill the sky. This may have been the catalyst for Shad becoming an airline pilot.

During his high school experience, Shad can recall less that five hundred students attending the whole school. There was a critical lack of science materials so the chemistry classes were cancelled before he graduated. Shad developed an interest in radio during this time and can recall purchasing a book entitled, 'Audel's Radioman's Guide' for the sum of four dollars. After much studying from this and several other radio books of the era, Shad became skilled enough to

become the local radio repairman in his town. He can recall being given several old radio's manufactured by Philco; Farnsworth and Atwater Kent so he could experiment with radios. These radios were donated to him by the only department store in town, so he could learn all about radios through experimentation and a lot of studying.

Shad's electronic and radio experimentation became intense as he read, experimented, listened to short wave communications and practiced copying morse code transmissions. He built up his code speed with a plan to travel up to

St. Louis, Missouri, over one hundred miles away, to take the General class radio test. He would have to hitch hike up to that City, but it did not come to pass before December 7, 1941.

Shad believe that he was a real scientist during high school. While other boys were shaving lemonwood staves to make archery bows, he was building a five tube radio receiver by winding the coil and matching the appropriate salvaged variable capacitor as a senior class physics project. He remembers being the 'wow' of his class mates and can recall that the girls were starting to take notice of him. In an article that appeared in the high school newspaper about him, Shad was quoted as saying that the real future for him might be working as a radio operating engineer at one of the 250 KW broadcasting

stations in the area. Shad recalls building a transceiver which allowed him to communicate illegally with the forest rangers who manned the fire watch stations in the forested area of southern Illinois. They were eager to rag chew with any voice, although Shad was always worried about a Government radio tracking truck filled with G men coming to take him away. It kept him alert and rather careful about not identifying himself.

The radio waves were full of speeches and news of Adolf Hitler in Germany. Shad recalls listening to Hitler stirring up the crowds in Berlin as it was broadcast around the World by radio. He can still recall listening deep into the night of the invasion reports on the radio from Poland & northern Europe.

Just after the Japanese sneak attack invasion at Pearl Harbor, Shad hitch hiked to Dayton, Ohio. He stayed briefly with his grandparents and then presented himself at Wright Patterson Army Airfield to enlist in the Air Force. Once he had completed the written questionnaire, the interviewer gave Shad a note and told him to report to a specific building on the base. The note said, 'Mr. General, can you use this man? Wow, thought Shad, a real General!! As it turned out, Mr. General (his real name) was in charge of the airborne radio repair shop and immediately took Shad in as a keen, bright new radioman.

Within a few days, Shad was sent to the Western Electric Bell Telephone lab in New York City to study a new airborne device called 'radar'. Even the word 'radar', seemed to be a secret in those days. His parents wrote to him later and advised him that Federal Government agents had been to his hometown and conducted an investigation on him to clear him for a 'top secret military/government clearance'. It was a good thing that they did not determine the depth of his involvement in the booze and bootlegging activity he was part of with the forest rangers.

Upon graduation, Shad was sent back to the Wright Patterson Army Air Field in Dayton, then on to Philadelphia, where he studied the first IFF (identification friend or foe) equipment that was being tested and designed at Philoc Corporation. Today, these devices are known as transponders. In those early days, the IFF hardware on board the aircraft were equipped with a secret stick of dynamite, triggered by an inertia switch which would destroy the equipment if the aircraft crashed. The pilot could also activate the explosive device if capture was imminent. They simply did not want the enemy to obtain the new secret equipment or know of its existence.

Shad was now in the big leagues of Air Force secret technology. He spent the Second World War years working in a lab in Hawaii on a secret project know only as 'Project X'. Their mission was to develop, test and maintain airborne radar equipment at Hickam Field. Another secret elsewhere in the Country was, 'Project Y', which was the Norden Bombsight.

Shad remained in Hawaii after the war and took flying lessons while he sold real estate. By 1952 he was flying for Hawaiian Airlines and in 1953 he received employment offers from Eastern; TWA and the Flying Tiger Line all on the same day. He took the Flying Tiger Line job and worked there for thirty years until he was forced to retire at age 60 in 1983. During that time, Shad became a Captain on many aircraft including the DC-3; C-46; DC-4;

DC-6; Lockheed Super Constellation; Canadair CL44; DC-8 and the Boeing 747. He became Vice President of Worldwide flight operations in 1978 and returned to the flight line as a senior 747 captain during his last two years there. Shad qualified as an instructor and a check pilot with over 30,000 hours of actual flight time logged. He owned several aircraft of his own over the years, but the one he was fondest of was the Beech 18 light twin that he used to take people up to Lake Tahoe from the greater San Francisco bay area. He did this often during his time off from the airline and sold real estate to prospective buyers. He can recall selling lots at Tahoe during the sixties for around four thousand dollars.

Shad spent a lot of time in real estate, not only with his initial selling experiences in Hawaii, but he became a licensed real estate broker in Illinois in 1954 and in California in 1967. He also attended Law School in San Francisco where he graduated from Lincoln Law School in 1983 and passed the extremely difficult California bar exam in 1989.

This is a man who just never slows down or stays idle for any reason.

Shad is an accomplished and published poet with much of his work being organized and published by either The Poet's Corner or The Poet's Loft of Hot Springs, Arkansas. He is a recognized poet member of the Poet's Society of the United States. His most famous and often published and quoted work is entitled; 'Dawns Early Light'. He is the past president of the Airline Pilots Association of American. Shad is also part of the recently released, two CD, collectors edition of the John Wayne movie entitled;

'The High and The Mighty'. Not only is Shad's well known poem shown in this movie, but he is actually interviewed as a commercial, over seas pilot who flew during the early fifties when the film was researched and made. This is a must see and hear movie on disc, especially the interview with Shad and several other pilots and a flight attendant of the time. It is quoted under the heading, 'Flying in the Fifties'. It closes with Shad's famous poem on the screen being read by an actor. This is our very own PAARA member. Shad has said that he will autograph this special two CD movie for any PAARA member who happens to catch him at a PAARA meeting and he will not charge anything.

Shad finally became legal and obtained his long sought after Extra class license in 1997. His call sign was KN6GW. He has since changed his call to K6CZ. He lives in Woodside and uses a Kenwood transceiver for a base station and a G5RV dipole for a base antenna.

PAARA welcomes Shad as a member of our rather unique radio club family. Please say hello to Shad at the meetings or events. He is rather friendly and has a lot of life experience to share.

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

Time Travel

with PAARA's Expeditionary Force by Vic Black AB6SO

Mobile Ground Unit Activated

PAARA's Expeditionary Force responded the first weekend in October to initiate the 2005 contesting season with the Fortieth

Anniversary California QSO Party (CQP). Various state QSO parties throughout the year encourage HF operation for those seeking to Work All States (WAS) and County Hunters answering the major challenge of working and confirming all 3,077 US counties. A handful of hardy folks have even operated FROM all US counties.

In 1975, Redwood City resident **Rusty Epps W6OAT** adopted the contest and established the winning formula which has made CQP the most popular of all state contests. The format is unique. Californians strive to work all 50 states plus 8 Canadian provinces and districts (Maritime Provinces, Northwest Territories plus VE2 thru VE7) for a total of 58 "multipliers".

Operators in Canada and the rest of the US seek out all 58 California counties. This creates an exciting and even playing field. Non-California stations may work only Californians. You may work a station for points credit on both SSB and CW on each HF contest band from 160 meters thru 10 meters plus SSB, CW and FM on 6 and 2 meters as an added incentive for Tech licensees. Total your earned contact points and multiply by the number of multipliers for a final score.

Most contests merely list scores in eight point type in magazines, but CQP awards real prizes. Participation awards include certificates, engraved plaques, commemorative coffee mugs, custom tee-shirts and custom labeled bottles of wine with entry names and callsigns for various entry classes.

Working all 58 multipliers is known as a "sweep". Prizes are available for sweeps and also for "First to 58", the first log to mark a sweep. In 2004, 662 logs were submitted, up from previous years.

Many California counties are considered "rare" because of a lack of active participants. They generate pile ups reminiscent of DXpeditions. Some single operator entries manage to make 2000 or more contacts (100 or more per hour) with multi operator entries approaching 4000 contacts during the weekend. The contest sponsor, Northern California Contest Club (NCCC), encourages LXpeditions, or local expeditions, to swarm over rare counties. Mobile "rover" stations may be worked for points and multipliers every time they enter a fresh county.

Although NCCC secretly salted the ionosphere prior to the contest to ensure good propagation, they held back on the salt so 10 meters didn't work as well as hoped. All other bands were in much better shape than predicted at this low point in the sunspot cycle. Most activity centered on 20, 40, 80, and to a lesser extent, 15 and 160 meters.

Rick Huisman N6DQ mounted an ambitious effort by attempting a mobile expedition assault on California's most northwesterly county, Del Norte. Part way up the coast he discovered how big California actually is and stopped about 150 miles north of San Francisco near Santa Rosa in Sonoma County to make his effort from there while the contest was still in progress. Otherwise he might still be driving.

Steve Leander KV6O made a run for the border and worked from a friend's desert station in San Bernardino County, diametrically opposite from Rick Huisman's original goal. This is where it got complicated. KV6O used callsign K6VO with Irvine, CA operator Dana Roode K6NR from the Roode Family Radio Club station K6VO. No problem except late at night when you'd like to go on cruise control, but have to keep the callsigns KV6O and K6VO straight in your mind. K6VO boasts a Force-12 C3E at 65', a 40 meter four square, a full-sized 80 meter quarter wave vertical with 66 radials, an inverted-L for 160, and miscellaneous other transmit antennas. There are north and east facing 300' beverages and K9AY receiving loops.

Even more ambitious was the deployment of an all out mobile rover adventure by driver Kit Blanke WA6PWW and operator Ron Chester W6AZ. They worked 40 and 20 meters SSB & CW as well as 80 CW using computer logging. Long drives require careful logistical planning to avoid wasting time setting up and tearing down lots of equipment. Fuel stops must be carefully timed when traveling on gravel back roads hour after hour, especially at night. This results in a series of carefully planned finite journeys, one county at a time. You quickly learn to avoid letting small problems cascade into major problems. They recorded over 20 hours continuous driving, mostly over wash board gravel roads covering more than 580 miles at elevations over 7500 feet at times in order to log as many counties as possible. Their odyssey took them through Santa Clara, Contra Costa, Solano, Sonoma and Marin counties prior to and after their operation with contacts made from Alameda, Napa, Colusa, Glenn, Tehama, Mendocino, and Trinity counties. They made a 20 minute layover in Lake County where the road penetrated only a few miles into the county. There were a few emergency stops to avoid wild life such as deer, quail, rattle snakes, road runners and miscellaneous unidentified critters that ran out to test Kit's driving reflexes.

Kit Kohlmoos W6ISO manned the home front to amass an admirable 47905 points from San Mateo County. Likewise, **Jack Troster W6ISQ** stayed home to earn 2109 points with paper logging and duping, also from San Mateo County.

Vic Black AB6SO stayed near home to work mobile from his secret DX location at the Palo Alto Wetlands Wildlife Refuge near the bay. The refuge is home to the rare and endangered Clapper Rail and the Salt Marsh Harvest Mouse, found nowhere else on earth. nal plan was to drive out to nearby, but somewhat rare, counties such as Yolo, Glenn, Colusa or Butte north of Sacramento, but memories of free-range feeding mosquito ranches near the rice paddies reminded him of why these are rare counties. On the plus side, by staying away there were no worries about malaria, dengue fever, yellow fever, avian flu or west Nile virus. Careful avoidance of rodents prevented Hantaan virus, Argentinean hemorrhagic fever and bubonic plague. (Travel CAN be hazardous).

Running 50 watts to a mobile whip with manual duplicate checking and logging resulted in 85 SSB contacts from Santa Clara County to stations all over North America including semi-rare ones such as Yukon Territory and Alaska. Contacts were spread out over 40, 20 and 15 meters with one on 10 meters. Operation had to stop at sundown as the reserve closes at night. Tactical error number one was sleeping late on Sunday. Error number two was failing to ford San Fancisquito creek into San Mateo County on Sunday in order to work everyone all over again to double the score.

When I was younger I raced bicycles for over 20 years. There were only five requirements in order to win a road race. They were Speed, Strength, Skill, Endurance, and the Will to Win. A little bit of cunning and good fortune were bonuses. That's a pretty simple formula. I considered things like bowling and golf as games rather than sports. Now that I'm a little older (err... I mean wiser) I realize that just staying in the chair for a 24 hour radio contest is a major sport in its own right. No matter what your score, the exhilaration and the shower after the competition are still highlights of the effort.

Newsflash! 2005 Field Day Results

PAARA: Pacific Division 4A Champion

The ARRL has posted the results of this year's Field Day on their website. The PAARA strategy for raising our rankings by moving up from Category 2A to 4A was completely successful. PAARA improved from 2004 to 2005 by every standard of measure, finishing as the Category 4A Champion in the Pacific Division.

Our claimed scored of 6,378 points on 1,939 QSO's was confirmed in the official results.

See the chart of Field Day Comparisons to see how our rankings improved from 2004 to 2005. We ranked #150 in the nation out of all entries (#182 in 2004) and #15 in our category (#56 in 2004.) Once again we won our category in the Santa Clara Valley section, but this year we also won our category in the entire Pacific Division (#4 in 2004.)

The Stanford club (W6YX) had the highest score in the SF Bay Area with 21,796 points from 7,250 QSO's. In fact they were #4 overall in the nation (#3 in 2004.) But they had the advantage of using commercial power, six transmitters, and their impressive antenna farm of fixed towers and beams in their special 6F category.

Our results look pretty good in comparison when you consider that we were limited to the use of emergency power, fewer transmitters and only temporary antennas.


