to talk to the new ARRL CEO on the phone. also did a bit of outreach to the Conejo Valley Amateur Radio Club in Thousand Oaks. Then there was the Maker Faire too!

The big PAARA effort at Field Day is almost upon us. At this point in time we've had several organizational meetings, and Doug, KG6LWE, has had our first Antenna Party and the second one is being scheduled now. It's almost time for our traditional Network Day, where we connect all of the radios, computers, keyers, and network gear together to see if everything will play together nicely. #### CQ CQ CQ Whiskey One Alpha Whiskey Stroke 6 W1AW/6 Special event station Pacificon calling CQ CQ CQ

That was my call sequence Friday evening while working the PAARA sponsored and supplied station at Pacificon 2015. Now here is my story of how this came to be.

I had decided to go up to Pacificon in San Ramon on Friday. I live in Gilroy south of San Jose and did not want to be up before dawn to get to the event Saturday morning. So I drove up on Friday afternoon. After I checked into the hotel, I then went to see what was happening. I found the Pacificon desk, checked in and got my badge and other papers. I had chosen not to attend the antenna seminar. However the vendor

rooms were open. As there was a very small crowd: I was able to spend time only not browsing the booths, but also talking with the vendors themselves. I made some purchases and went out to the car to put them away. Next I went to check out the radio station our PAARA radio club

was providing.

I found the station setup under a canopy on the patio next to the hotel. I talked with Rick N6DQ about the setup there. He invited me to work a station as there was only one other operator there at that time. Even thought it was nearly 6 PM and I was thinking of supper; I sat down and thought I would work the station for an hour or so. Rick set me up on 80 meter sideband. He tweaked the tuner for my operating frequency. And I began to call CQ. It took a bit to familiarize myself with the setup. But it was basic the field day station I had worked before; Icom transceiver, Hy-Toko amp and a big tuner, also a laptop computer with the logging program running.

CQ CQ CQ W1AW/6 calling. I made several quick contacts. After a bit, Rick walked over and said to me "Doyle... this is not a contest, you can talk with these people". So I switched to a more normal chatty operating mode. I made a point to not only get a call sign from my contact, but to also get a signal report and a name as that was the exchange for confirming the contact with the ARRL special event station as we were running under their call W1AW. Much of my conversations were the usual, about radios, antennas, weather, location, and so forth.

It was also my first time operating on 80 meters. At my station I operate on 40 meters, with 20 meters and 15 meters being my favorites. 80 meters was different.

> Most contacts were relatively local, the bay area and the central valley. But there were some distant contacts as well. San Diego for several, a few in Seattle and Colorado and one in Texas. I took a supper break about 8:30 PM and returned to work the band until just after 11 PM. I had a good time.

I also had several memorable contacts. One was with an operator in British Columbia. He wanted to make sure I knew he was located as far north in BC as one could be and not be in Alaska. I had several contacts with people who did not realized Pacificon was happening. A couple of those operators said they would make the trip on Saturday. One amusing contact was with a fellow in the central valley. He said "Pacificon??? That means it is October already.... I better take the kids out to get pumpkins." One time I hear a very weak call just above the noise level. I went back to him.

He returned with a now very strong signal. He told me he had his transmitter turned down to 1 watt and as he was doing some testing and neglected to turn up the power. He was amazed I had heard him. Yup... the Icom has Several contacts asked a good receiver. about the call I was using W1AW/6. One fellow even asked if I was for real! YES... was my reply, this is a special event station operating under the ARRL call for the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Late that evening I had a older operator return my CQ call. He told me he had been waiting to get a turn talking with me. He was on a ranch in south central Texas. I told him I had grown up in Texas, but he declined to get more specific as to his location. As our conversation concluded he commented he need to be off to bed as he had to be out on the tractor at day break. I realized it was after 11 PM: that would be after 1 AM for him.

As it was getting late I declared the frequency clear and made my last sign off.

Yes it was well after 11 PM and I need to be off to my room for a nights sleep.

**Tomorrow was Pacificon!** 

On Saturday I checked by the station several times. Each time it was a busy place with multiple operators making contacts and lots of people chatting.

I had a great time there at Pacificon.

## The PAARA Repeater Joel Wilhite – KD6W

Nobody was more surprised than me when Howard Califf (K6HOC – SK) wheeled in a stack of new ICOM boxes on a hand truck to the PAARA general meeting one night, donating an entire stack of D-Star repeater modules to the club. It was all his fault. And so began the very long story of how it all started. But let us fast forward to today and we are now moving away from D-Star for 2M and 70cm operation and launching our new high level site with DMR. There is a HUGE back story to this which I will get around to telling someday so you can tell your grandchildren this nearly unbelievable story of how it all started with the kind and generous gift from our departed friend from Ham Radio Outlet.

The system is nearly finished for all but a handful of punch list items which are being cleaned up as I write this. The repeater system is now partially operational at its new home up 650 feet above sea level; the new site has a commanding view of the entire West Bay all the way up into parts of Marin County and into parts of Gilroy. The advantage of the new site is the shielding we get from the mountain behind us in the direction of Beale AFB and so we can safely run our 440 machine without concern of interference with PAVE PAWS.

For those who are knowledgeable about how machines are coordinated in Northern California, observers would have noticed we let our coordinations lapse and this was because we were under construction before they expired. I let NARCC know our intentions to move the repeater to a whole new location and so they agreed it was better to drop the current coordination and simply update the coordinations with the new information once the work was completed. We have resubmitted the coordinations, including our previous 2 meter machine which some still consider controversial but is now becoming more accepted. The digital machines above and below us on the band have all been running at those pairs for over a year now and has not met any major resistance. It seems we can coexist without thermonuclear warfare.

A quorum was present.

Though Kristen (K6WX) wasn't present, she indicated via email that her reserve of stories is doing OK but as always on the lookout for more stories. If you have committed to a story but not submitted it (there are several people out there fitting this category) please put pen to paper or fingers on the keyboard and let your creative juices flow! Do you have any projects, Field Day experiences, technical articles, hints n kinks, DX contacts, or experiences setting up your station or antenna, on the air experiences that might be of interest? If you have not previously drafted that story or have a new story, now is the time to get a byline of your own in PAARAgraphs and get that story submitted to Kristen for publication. "Remember it is 'home grown' stories that make PAARAgraphs great", she said

Vice President's Report: Marty, W6NEV, announced that Joel, KD6W, will be giving a talk about the new PAARA repeater and DMR. Marty also announced having lined up speakers through the end of the year. He's now working at finding speakers for next year. If you know of someone who would be of interest to the group, let Marty know.

Secretary's report: Jim, K6SV, reported that there are currently 178 PAARA members. Last year at this time there were only 155 members! What a wonderful increase to the membership. He also reported that there were 3 new members joining in May. He hopes to update the PAARA roster on the web site this month.

Treasurer's Report: Ron, W6AZ, provided the board with fanatical reports on the status of PAARA. Additionally a report comparing 2104 to 2015 was reviewed. A detailed discussion on various aspects of the reports ensued. There was additional discussion on areas of increased expense as well as areas of reduced expenses. The long and short of it is the club is in a fine financial condition.

Ron also noted that there still aren't any proceeds from the Flea Market this year. It is hoped that this condition will change in the upcoming months as PAARA is hosting the July Flea Market.

Under Old Business, Marty, W6NEV, mentioned Field Day T-shirt sales have closed and

the order for 28 shirts has been placed. He anticipates having the shirts for pickup at the June meeting. Should you not be at the June meeting, he'll have the shirts at the Field Day site.

Joel, KD6W, reported that he and Jim, K6SV, moved the repeater equipment into the shack and connected the feed lines to the antennas. There are a number of small items that must be completed and tests conducted before the repeater can go live but it's getting real close to being on the air!

Jim, K6SV, mentioned that at the last board meeting there was a discussion regarding the acquisition of 6 laptop computers for use at field day and other club sponsored events requiring computers either in standalone use or when connected to radios. As there wasn't a quorum at the last board meeting, an email vote was conducted as the decision couldn't wait until the next board meeting. The email vote passed and the computers along with USB to RS232 interfaces have been purchased. The board is looking for a club member to oversee this asset so the computers are ready for use when needed and their location can be kept track of. If interested, contact a board member.

Marty, W6NEV reported that plans for Field Day are progressing with most everything having a volunteer to cover. He's still looking for volunteers for setup, operation, and teardown. The antenna work party dates were announced as being May 21st and May 28th. See Doug, KG6LWE, or Marty if you can help in any way.

Marty also mentioned that Bob Korte, KD6KYT, the Field Day extra point's coordinator, emailed him about the new social media bonus point's category which requires having a presence on one of the social media sites in order to earn the 100 bonus points. As time is of the essence to implement a PAARA on line social media presence, there was a discussion on which site to create a presence on and who in the club is best suited to make this happen quickly. If you are that person, please contact Bob immediately to get the ball rolling.

Ron, W6AZ, once again mentioned the inventory of PAARA "stuff" which is located at various members QTH's. As no one really has a handle on exactly what "stuff" there is, it was agreed that an inventory should be conducted to determine what the equipment is, its location and condition. Once the "stuff" is identified, it will be easier to manage and make decisions on what, if anything, should be done with it. This process will take a bit of time to complete and is in need of a champion to complete the task. If interested please let a board member know.

Under new business, Joel, KD6W, brought up the need for a dedicated computer at the new repeater shack. This computer can be the same as the field day computers but it's needed at the shack at all times for a number of reasons including positive rig control. A vote was taken and the acquisition of one more computer matching the field day computers was approved.

Kristen, K6WX, reminded (via email) the board that July is PAARA's month for hosting the Flea Market. As it's directly after Field Day, it will be more challenging than usual. Remember that this is THE major money making event for PAARA so lots of volunteers are needed. See or contact Kristen to volunteer your services.

The Board meeting was adjourned at 9:01 PM.

years that this leads to a smooth setup on the actual day so that we can begin operating right at 11 AM without a hitch. The antennas also are marked for quick assembly, so that the setup crew can minimize effort and misconfigurations. This year we will be operating 4A, as in prior years, with the stations separated by both band and mode. SSB-A will be on 20m and 80m, CW-A 15m and 40m, SSB-B will be on 15m and 40m, CW-B on 20m and 80m. And GOTA will be on 20m, 15m, and 10m as appropriate. If you want to operate one of these stations, please contact the Station Captains: CW -KG6O and K6WX, SSB - N6DB and W6NEV, GOTA - N6ETC. In particular, we need participants for the GOTA, or Get On The Air station. It's not so much that we get extra points for that activity, but that we have a chance to introduce new people to our hobby, and particularly to the magic of the HF bands. If you know of anyone, please contact any of the Captains, or anyone on the PAARA Leadership Team.

About 2 weeks ago, my phone rang with an unfamiliar number. I usually screen my calls, so I didn't answer immediately. It turned out to be someone from ARRL HQ. I was thinking, why are they calling me? 
