Good thing the K2 happened to be in the trunk. The K3 had never been on phone before. Well, the K2 mic didn't transmit any audio, so what to do. Well, I just pulled out the trusty old K2. That worked! It was the first time the K2 has seen serious action in years. Then there was a loud crackling noise on receive on the K2. We also heard serious interference on GOTA with the same crackling. Joel, KD6W, heard it also all the way up on 2m. We knew something serious was going on. Rick, N6RK, suggested there was a bad antenna - he was right. Doug pulled the tribander down. The gamma match was really lose. The crew tightened everything up and the antenna went back up. #### Field Day Snapshot Report By Doug Teter KG6LWE

It's the Monday after Field Day as I write. After a good night's sleep, I am just home from towing the tower trailer back from my shop where I left it yesterday.

I know many of you are interested in how it went for PAARA. As you may already know, this was not our smoothest Field Day ever.

After an excellent start Thursday evening, with the rapid assembly and erection of the big KT34XA tribander, and the 2 element 40 meter mono band antenna for the B stations down at Stonehenge, we left Marty, W6NEV, to babysit the aluminum overnight. So far, so good.

Friday dawned cool and a little cloudy, which helped with the heat for a while. The team met at the park at 9:00 AM. The rest of the antennas, masts and tower went up quickly and smoothly. This seems to go better each year.

Then we headed to U-Haul to pick up the trucks we would use as shelters for the stations, and that's when things started hitting the fan. After waiting in a long line, we were told that despite confirming the reservation twice earlier that week, only 3 of the 5 trucks I reserved in *January*, were there, and that the other two were promised to someone else for Sunday.

Despite my best efforts over the course of the next 90 minutes to convince the people there at the store and at Corporate, that they should honor their commitment, we had to leave with only three trucks.

Frustrated, but hopeful that something could be worked out the next day we called it a day. Leaving Ric, N6AJS, our new CW-B Station Captain with the overnight watch, I headed home to bank some sleep.

That was interrupted about 11:30 PM by a call from Marty, W6NEV, our Phone-B Station Captain, saying he was being taken to the hospital with atrial fibrillation. After assuring me that he would be OK, he broke the news that he would not be at Field Day. (Field Day-Continued from page 2)

In addition to being in charge of a station, Marty has been my backup for the last two seasons, and one of the more experienced members of the setup team. Losing him was a blow.

Jim, K6SV, contacted his friend Randy, K8TR, who volunteered to step in for Marty on Saturday morning and oversee the station through the event, so I was starting to feel a little better about things. I called U-Haul around 9:00 AM and was told that our trucks were at the store, so we headed over to pick them up. Jim also contacted his XYL, who was making soup for dinner. With only 4 hours' notice, she was able to purchase additional soup so there would be enough for everyone.

Of course, when we got there, "our trucks" weren't there, as they hadn't been returned by the previous renters yet. No amount of persuasion or argument with the people at the store or at Corporate on the phone would convince them to let us have any of the half -dozen box trucks in the yard. Those weren't "our ones."

At about 10:15 AM, I finally gave up and took two cargo vans (Ford E150's), which while a bit cramped when compared to box vans, worked surprisingly well.

11:00 AM came, and all of our stations except Phone-B went on the air. Randy had assembled Marty's station, but couldn't get his radio to transmit. Lots of time went out the window trying everything we could think of. We finally gave up on Marty's FT-1000MP, and went to Kristen's K3 which she had brought as a backup rig.

That radio had never had a mic connected to it, and we were unable to get it to transmit on SSB either. Rather than waste more time on troubleshooting, Kristen reached a little deeper into the trunk of her Mustang, and pulled out her K2.

When Randy got the K2 plugged in it worked fine for the duration of the event. Relieved, I left Stonehenge to check on everything else. Both

In attendance were Kristen McIntyre, K6WX (Pres), Jim Thielemann, K6SV (Secretary/Membership), Ron Chester, W6AZ (Treasurer) via videoconference, Larry Rebarchik, N6DB (Dir), Darryl Presley, KI6LDM (Dir), Joel Wilhite, KD6W (Dir & Technical Coordinator), Doug Teter, KG6LWE (Field Day Coordinator). A quorum was present.

Kristen, (K6WX), mentioned the "free advertising" PAARA receives when she or other PAARA members travel to other club meetings or conventions. The "advertising" starts with making sure to wear your badge when attending these events and continues with every person you talk to at the event.

Kristen mentioned her reserve of stories is effectively non-existent! She desperately needs stories. Please, if you've committed to a story but not submitted it (there are several people out there fitting this category) put pen to paper or fingers on the keyboard and let your creative juices flow! Do you have any projects, Field Day experiences, technical articles, hints n kinks, DX contacts, or experiences setting up your station or antenna, on the air experiences that might be of interest? Christopher, Al6KG, our new GOTA Captain, and Joel, KD6W, VHF/UHF Station Captain, reported broadband interference from the B stations, which was de-sensing their radios and crippling their operations. It seemed that Phone-B and CW-B's signals were also getting into each other's radios.

After scratching our heads, we had a couple of probabilities to look into, none of which seemed likely. Rick, N6RK, who was operating at CW-B said he thought it was the antenna. He has a KT-34XA, and said they're notorious for causing spurious emissions when any of the many aluminum to aluminum connections aren't perfect.

We decided to pull the antenna down and give it a look. It had scoped perfectly after assembly, but I found a loose clamp on the gamma match tube that connects the balun to one of the driven elements. After tightening that clamp, we went to our stations and found the radios much quieter, and no longer blasting out the noise they had been doing.

The loose joint that looked good to the antenna analyzer's milliwatt signal was arcing under the load of the two 100 watt signals from both B stations feeding through Kristen's new triplexer/filter setup. We had effectively turned our stations into spark gap transmitters that were blasting interference from 2 meters on down.

Having 4 of our 6 stations in trouble for the first several hours of the contest (I mean event) probably put a bit of a dent in the Q count, but with the problem solved, we went to work making up for it. Thankfully, that was the last of our rude surprises and the rest of the "event" was uneventful.

Jim's preliminary look at the log showed 4,039 contacts, for 5,689 raw points on Q's. GOTA logged an additional 236 contacts this year. Given less than ideal band conditions, and a spate of unexpected problems, not too bad.

Thanks to all who participated in preparation, setup/teardown, operating and gathering extra points. What a GREAT team!


Under Old Business,






