that I was essentially out of a job! That's exactly what I like to see. Thank you Christopher. I had an appointment to meet Masa, JR1AQN, at the station to set up FT8. I got a text and escorted him to set things up. We had to poke around a bit to get the SignalLink USB working that he had had donated for use with the station. We didn't have rig control working, so we ended up doing it the simple way - VOX. With a few level adjustments and tweaking of the VOX settings, we were on the air. We had an almost immediate pileup on 15 meters from stations across the US. I guess W1AW is a bit of a draw. At that point we began to wonder if these were the first W1AW contacts on FT8. Who knows. I'll bet that they are the first W1AW/6 contacts, at least. I signed him up for Saturday. With that in the bag, and a bit more schmoozing, I headed to dinner with Darryl, KI6LDM, and Linda, K6GRL, up from Fort Ord. We had a great meal. From there I headed to the bar where I met my friend Mark, W6MES, from SoCal. Mark and I seem to meet each other at hamfests all over the place. I stayed for a while, but not too long since I was going home that eventing. It was so great seeing everyone and talking.

Digital for Field Day FREDERIC M HULETT, III

What I wanted to accomplish:

For the past three years, I have joined the PAARA field day operation at Palo Alto's Bedwell Park. I was so impressed with the operation in 2015 that I joined the club, and continue to be impressed with the stations, and the membership.

This year, I was encouraged to captain the CW-B station (20m/80m, by Stonehenge). The FD committee discussed digital operation as an additional point source, but we decided not to pursue this. I enjoy the digital modes: It was PSK31 that rekindled my interest in ham radio about 10 years ago.

So, I gathered information to build the case that W6ARA should include digital modes in our next Field Day outing. Here's what I came up with.

Why should we operate digital?

Everybody is "fresh meat". Even stations we have worked before during the contest we can work in digital mode, and get credit. According to the FD rules, we can work each station once per band and mode. Aside from the fun of RTTY and/or PSK31, there are points to be made. Digital QSO's, like CW, are worth 2 points SSB QSO's each. count one. We could have increased presence on a hot band. 20 40 or We could potentially improve the club's results against other 4A stations, or against our Santa Clara Valley competition.

It's not a contest, but...

The PAARA FD operation is pretty effective, and competitive. Since 2008, we have entered in class 4A. During that time, we have the scores and ranking as shown in Table 1.

To move up one spot in the 4A rankings would take an average of 288 additional CW or Digital QSOs. However, in 2016, 33 more Q's would have moved us into a tie with K8ES (Delaware ARA).



To become the top scoring 4A station would take an average of 654 additional Qs.

What are the logistics?

Here is how we work the bands: We have 4 HF stations (not counting GOTA and VHF), two A stations and two B stations. Because of the antennas and the proximity, we can only operate two stations on a band, i.e. 20 phone, 20 CW.

There are not many times when three bands have good activity. Here is a graph of our QSOs by band in 2017:



So, if we move to a digital station, we have to take one of the Phone or CW operations on a working band down while we run digital.

But do we really?

Class 4A allows us 4 simultaneous transmitted

signals. What if we used the tribander from the GOTA station to put a third station on 20m?

Field Day rules prohibit using a transceiver under more than one callsign during the event: Once we use the GOTA rig under W6OTA, we can't use it as W6ARA.

If we use a different transceiver, we are not bound by the transceiver limitation. We could take one of the other stations off the air while we operate digital. (Or, we could slip up to class 5A).

When would we operate and on what band?

The 'money bands' for digital are going to be 20m and 40. When 20 meters is open, we should not step away from the productive CW and SSB modes. Same goes when 40 is the hot band.

It's important to have the GOTA station on the air for as long as we have guests. This might slow down after about 8:00 pm, or early on Sunday morning, after 20m opens up. This year, the GOTA station was busy as long as there was activity on 20m, but Sunday morning was not occupied.

We could move to 20M on the GO-TA tribander, with a different transceiver, for an hour or two on Sunday morning. By adding a wire dipole, we could also exploit 40m in the night / early morning.

How effective would we likely be?

A step up in the ranking might require a couple hundred QSOs.

Any PSK or RTTY QSO's have to be in addition to any QSO points that we are giving up from the station we take off the air. For this reason, the best station to take down would be SSB-A (15/40m).

I traded e-mails with Bill Frantz, AE6JV. He's the digital wrangler for the WVARA field day op-


eration. He told me:

"slightly over 11% of our QSO points were from digital QSOs... We used both PSK31 and RTTY. I didn't see much activity on other modes. There aren't nearly as many stations using digital for field day as are using SSB/CW/FM."

A few of the field day stations post their results to 3830scores.com. I compared the scores posted by class 3A, 4A and 5A stations, and plotted the trend of stations reporting digital QSO's, compared with stations reporting no digital. In this limited sample, the 'no digital' stations had significantly higher scores.

So, what's the bottom line?

I started out wanting to show that a digital operation would be an advantage for our operation at W6ARA. The data sent me in another direction:



Top-scoring stations don't use digital, the logistics of putting a third signal on 20 are challenging, and the activity on digital is low compared to SSB or CW.

It would still be fun to try some digital operation next year, but we can't expect a big payoff. The final decision will be made by the Field Day Committee, and the interested operators. What do you think?

A quorum was present.

Kristen, (K6WX), opened with a discussion regarding an email she received about the "friendliness" or lack thereof of PAARA. The board discussed the topic and resolved that the board members could do a better job of mingling during the breaks at meetings and introducing members to each other, especially new members.

Kristen mentioned her reserve of stories is still rather thin and at best, has a one month backlog. Please, if you've committed to a story but not submitted it (there are several people out there fitting this category) put pen to paper or fingers on the keyboard and let your creative juices flow! As you recall, on February 6^{th,} the PAARA board sent a letter to the ASVARO board requesting they call a general meeting of all participating clubs. A meeting with the ASVARO board and other clubs was held on May 6, 2017. Action items were documented, however, to date there still doesn't seem to be much of any action on any of the items discussed at the meeting except the creation of a Face Book account.

Darryl, KI6LDM, updated the board on his data mining for Bay Area hams who have either renewed or received their 1st licenses. He reported that there were 26 newly licensed hams in September. The board is still working on the card to send to new hams.

Don Rodoni, KE6CFX, SK

Born August, 1944, Died August 2017



Don was a quiet, reserved man with a generous and giving heart. He was a Journeyman Plumber for over 45 years. He went into the family business, first with Rodoni-Becker and Company, then he left the family business and went to Cooper Brothers Plumbing (now owned by another company). He was Vietnam Veteran -1965 to 1971; SGT - E5 upon discharge. Don won a Bronze Star with Oak Leaf Cluster and Purple Heart.

Don was a stalwart member of PAARA, was deeply involved with our Field Day activities, club antenna parties, Electronic Flea Market, and antenna removal and installation work PAARA did for other hams. He was always there at the field events, usually the first one to arrive, and always with the right tools. That was Don. If he had it, he'd use it and help, if he didn't have it, he'd either get it or adapt something to do the job.

Don also had a wide variety of interests. He loved to tinker and putter. He would take apart and rebuild all sorts of mechanical items, fixing them. He built the family's first entertainment system. It included a turntable, 8-track player, radio, reel-to-reel recorder, with editing and a sound board. He also did lighting and sound work for the family stage group, UnScene, for many years. He worked with William Shakespeare and Friends doing a lot of Shakespeare plays and other plays of that time period. Don rebuilt the family 1972 VW bug engine and taught the family about cars at the same time.

Don will be truly missed by all he touched.

belongs to will be using the radios at one point to make JT65 contacts with Japan.

Marty presented a quote for additional PAARA T-shirts as discussed at the last board meeting. The board agreed to move ahead with the acquisition of additional shirts.

Jim, K6SV, and Joel, KD6W, reported some progress toward getting a battery backup system installed in the PAARA repeater shack. Two new equipment racks were installed in the shack along with re-racking the repeater equipment into one of the racks. This was done in order to have more room for more equipment. Two 100# 200Ah batteries were also moved to the shack. The 2nd rack will contain the batteries and needed power distribution to back up the equipment. We also noted that a bit of tree trimming is needed around the antennas. During their visit, they documented how much electricity had been used by the site, 1036 kWH. The board voted to pay the site owner \$0.25 per kWH, which is the current high demand PG&E power rate.

Kristen, K6WX reminded the board that it's election "season". Clark, KK6ISP, wasn't able to attend but via email indicated no one had come forward yet to run for office outside of the existing board members. All club members are encouraged to let Clark know if they wish to nominate a member or run for office themselves. Nominations will close at the end of the November 3rd meeting. All members with current memberships will vote at the December 1st meeting.

The board renewed the discussion on what to do with the PAARA property which is currently stored at various members' QTH's. The board is still gathering information on what PAARA has, if there is truly any value in keeping it somewhere or if it should be liquidated in one manor or another. This is an ongoing process with several answers waiting on the completion of fact gathering activities.

There are several other items on the agenda that haven't been worked on very much or could wait until the next meeting, thus at this point there is no new news on them.

Under New Business:

The board discussed the merits of dividing the Office of the Treasure's responsibilities. With Ron Chester, W6AZ, relocating to Illinois, his ability to attend meetings to collect money and pay bills is not realistic. For the past year plus, Bob Korte, KD6KYT, has attended meetings, collected the money, made bank deposits and paid bills at Ron's direction. Ron has attended the board meetings via videoconference. The board examined the bylaws for anything that would preclude this arrangement from continuing. As none were found, the board agreed to continue with this distribution of responsibilities and Ron's method of "attending" the board meetings, assuming Ron and Bob agree on the arrangement. Ron will maintain the responsibilities of Office of the Treasure with Bob assisting Ron at Ron's direction.

Kristen, K6WX, sent an email out to the board before the board meeting regarding an opportunity for a fund-raising activity. The opportunity is to have one of several participating restaurants give a small percentage of the proceeds to the club from members having a meal at the selected restaurant on a selected day. After a short discussion, the board agreed to move forward with further exploration of the opportunity.

The Board meeting was adjourned at 9:02 PM.






