Greetings to everyone from Biên Hòa, a little north of Saigon. I'm having the time of my life staying with my friend's family for the Lunar New Year, which was on the 16th of February this




year. Sadly it didn't seem easy to get a Vietnamese ticket before going, so I passed on that. But ham radio has been fine without me for a couple of weeks:).

This trip has been something very special. I have become friends with a young Vietnamese woman in Fremont named ThuyHong. She got her US citizenship several years ago and has been going to San Jose State to study to be a teacher. On several occasions she's asked me to proofread her papers or help her out to understand some philosophical and historical texts that she was assigned. Having become proficient in another language, I really admired her courage to pursue a degree after acquiring a

Motorcycle Mobile John KM6LQZ

I recently mounted a 2m/440 mobile radio on my motorcycle. I enjoy using it to chat with my riding companions, and it's useful for public service The radio is positioned behind the saddle. To mate with existing bolt holes in the rear subframe, I made a model bracket out of aluminum flashing, translated that to a working drawing and took it to Precision Metal Works in Campbell

communication at athletic events, where hams coordinate support and aid for bicyclists or runners.

to fabricate from sheet steel. The bracket is connected by four rubber vibration isolators to a watertight aluminum project box, mounted upside down with the radio inside and a 32" whip antenna on top. The radio control head rides up front in a tank bag, together with the interface to a mic and earphones built into my helmet, and a PTT button on the handgrip under my left thumb.

The vibration on a motorcycle is hard on antennas, other riders have told me. Long antennas are prone to break from getting whipped around, and designs that have a coil in a capsule in the middle tend to break where the capsule is bonded to the whip. The Larsen whip I'm using has the whip rod itself twisted into a loose coil, which has held up so far. But the first time I took the rig on a long ride, I arrived with no whip! Vibration loosened the set screws that fasten it to the

base coil, and the whole whip bounced out. It's somewhere in Oakland, I guess. I replaced the whip and put Loctite on the set screws, and I haven't lost the second one yet!

As the days ticked down, I began to wonder what I'd done to myself. I didn't speak a word of Vietnamese and I was going to stay with this

family that I didn't know at all. I thought back to how I'd gone to Japan so many years ago by myself and survived. All I had to do was be observant and let whatever happened happen. I've been to lots of strange places before, like Alor Setar in Malaysia. I have a translation app on the phone for emergencies. I got a gig of data for the phone too. This will work out somehow.

Long story short, it has worked out well and more. I'm having such a wonderful time with a loving family here in Biên Hòa, where they treat me like one of their sisters. We've done so many fun things, but my favorite is going to the beauty shop to get our hair washed (sorry guys). It's so luxurious and cheap, and so necessary in sultry Southeast Asia. Here are a couple of snippets from my experience.

I went to an evening mass held in the cemetery where ThuyHong's father and grandfather are

buried. Out of thousands, I was the only Caucasian there. Everyone was staring at me, understandably. In fact, I haven't seen another white person since the airport, and even then there were few.

One morning I attended morning mass (7 AM!) with some of the family. It's so strange seeing all this Catholicism here. I'm not Catholic, but find it fascinating to observe. A remnant of the French, no doubt. We spent the afternoon at a park looking at a special display of flowers for the new year.

ThuyHong's brothers find it fascinating that I drink, and that it mostly doesn't affect me. They brought out the whiskey last night. We drank quite a lot. Lots of talking. Sometimes I get a translation, sometimes not. It's all okay. I just go with the flow. I am picking up a few words, though, and have started studying Vietnamese online. Next time I hope to be able to speak a little. It doesn't seem like a very hard language. At least the grammar is similar to English, unlike Japanese which is totally different. And the letters are the same, only with a lot of accents and diacritics. Probably also the French influence.

More ham radio stuff next month, but I thought you might enjoy something different. Looks like we're on for the next PAARAplink on March 4th, the day after the meeting. Hope to see you then for some therapeutic plinking. Chào bạn. CU AT PAARA DE K6WX/XV






