The KH1/KH7Z DXpedition to **Baker Island** John Miller, K6MM

Our program for the evening will be a presentation by John, K6MM, on his experiences from the recent KH1/KH7Z DXpedition to Baker Island. It had been 16 years since the last KH1 activation. The team logged almost 70,000 QSOs in 9 days, working under rather harsh conditions near the equator. The Baker Island expedition was the first DXpedition to use the new "dxpedition mode" with FT8. More than 6,000 FT8 QSOs were logged.

Bio

John was first licensed as WV2BQJ in 1958 while living in Syracuse, NY. For the last decade, he has focused heavily on DXing, contesting, and recruiting new operators into the hobby. His DXCC total stands at 331 confirmed and he holds 8-Band DXCC. John has been a member of several DXpedition teams: PJ7E (Sint Maarten), K9W (Wake Atoll), K1N (Navassa Island), K5P (Palmyra Is-Iand), and KH1/KH7Z (Baker Island).

John is the President of the Northern California DX Foundation; Past-President of the Northern California Contest Club; a founding member of the CW Operators' Club; and past Director of the Northern California DX Club. He served as Co-Chairman of the International DX Convention for 2011, 2013, 2015, 2017, and 2019. John is also the PAARA. website manager.

In addition to his four grandchildren, John's interests include website design, piano composition, and exploring the back roads of the Bay Area on his Harley Davidson motorcycle.

President's Corner

It's nearly fall, and as Amateur Radio operators fall means two things: better propagation and contests. The first might be iffy, but the second is coming regardless propagaof



tion. Don't forget that the PAARA sponsored ASVARO Electronics Flea Market is this month, and we need volunteers. And Pacificon is coming up fast.

As I write this I was reading that two big sunspots are just rotating into view. This has bumped the sunspot number up to 29 and the Solar Flux Index to 71. That's a vast improvement from the strings of zero sunspots and SFI in the 60s that we have been seeing recently. I can't find the reference, but I recall that about a month ago we had accumulated approximately 120 spotless days in 2018. That's a high number for this point in the cycle. We don't know

Field Day 2018 Jim K6SV

Now that another great Field Day (FD) has passed us by, wondering minds are left to ponder what was and what could have been. Though I can't answer what could have been, I can provide some information on what was. Leading up to FD Doug, KG6LWE, and the station captains along with key players gathered at Marty's, W6NEV, QTH for a planning meeting. As the members of this group had done this before and not much changed from last year, this turned into the only organizational meeting held. That doesn't mean to say there weren't things to make sure were covered but those items were left to email exchanges.

The plan was for 2 antenna parties to make sure all the fantastic antennas we erect were in top notch condition. That also meant thoroughly testing them to fix and avoid the "RF wideband radiator" from the year before. Things went well until partway through the 2nd party when the tilting winch on the white tower trailer let go with about 2' before the tower nested. The winch had been giving us problems earlier in the day but "decided" to have no more of it. No one was hurt but the 40M 2 element beam was a bit bent/ broken. That meant we had to fix the antenna, fix the tower trailer and assemble and test the last antenna before FD.

This development required scheduling another antenna party to fix the antenna, as no parts could be scrounged from other antennas. The winch also had to be dealt with. Marty, W6NEV, found a new winch could be purchased. The decision was made to purchase 2 so the tower extension winch, the same model as the tilt winch, could be replaced next year. Jim, K6SV, made modifications to the crank bolt on the new winch so the extension crank would engage the new winch. He went to Doug's, KG6LWE, the weekend before the antenna party to fix the winch issue so time wouldn't be wasted repairing the trailer instead of working on antennas. The 3rd antenna party finished with the successful repair of the 40M and testing of the last antenna. All the antennas for FD were affixed to the top of the box trailer for transport.

Outside of U-Haul's scheduling ineptitude, the rest of FD went smoothly. The setup crew started work on Thursday after 5 PM and were able to get both Station B towers set with antennas assembled and on them. The setup crew gathered again on Friday to finish setting up all the towers and antennas and elevate them to operating elevation. Saturday came and the event started as smoothly as it could, given the U-Haul issues. Then before we knew it, the event was over and time to make like we were never there.

That only left one key item to take care of, file the results with the ARRL and provide all the backup needed to prove the claimed extra points are justified. So, what does that mean? Jim, K6SV, gathers information from Rebar, N6DB, who takes the logs from the stations and produces dup files which list all recorded contacts by the band and ID's the duplicates. Those logs are used to figure out the score for contacts and submitted as part of the report. Bob Korte, KD6KYT, provides information on his publicity efforts and any publications that may have printed something about FD. Jim also gathers information from others like Pink, K7ILA, who passed traffic as the actual messages have to be included in the ARRL report. Then there's gathering of the social media posts, scanning the visitor's log, and photographs documenting all the bonus point categories are gathered. The ARRL filing includes going onto a website to fill out all the information on the club, how many contacts by band and mode, GOTA contacts, and bonus points. All the info is then put in a big pot, stirred not shaken, and after many hours of work out pops an 85-page report to the ARRL documenting our efforts which is rushed to the printer then FedEx for delivery to the ARRL before the submission deadline.

So, if you read this far, likely you're interested in the score PAARA is claiming. Remember, the score isn't official until the ARRL releases all the results in the November time frame. So, in a nutshell, we're claiming 11,796 points. This is down 2,124 from last year's total. We won't know for sure how our score compares with other clubs until after the ARRL posts the results. At that point, we may be in a better position to speculate

about the difference between years.

What I can say is that most of the difference can be found in the points from contacts being down 2,014 from last year. Both CW and Phone were down. Interestingly, the number of points we were down this year from last is almost the same for CW as Phone. That also means there were two times fewer phone contacts as CW owing to CW contacts counting as 2 points where phone contacts count as 1 point.

With respect to the bands, CW was down ~200 contacts from last year on 80M and 40M where phone was up ~50 contacts on 80M and down 200 contacts on 40M. CW gained a few contacts over last year on 20M whereas phone lost ~400 contacts. On 15M, CW gained ~30 contacts but phone lost ~60 contacts. Interestingly, last year we had no contacts on 10M where this year we managed 49 on phone. There were also ~40 more contacts on 6M this year than last.

From a GOTA perspective, we made 29 more contacts this year than last year. We also scored 40 more bonus points this year than last due to more youth making more contacts which earn us more points than non-youth.

Speaking of bonus points, we got points in all categories except for 2. We didn't copy the W1AW message well enough to qualify for having copied the message and we didn't have a satellite contact. Those are both bonus categories that need to have a champion next year. We also didn't have the maximum of 10 NTS messages but didn't completely lose out as we did have 5 handled messages thanks to Pink, K7ILA.

Thanks to Bob Korte, KD6KYT, and his efforts manning the Public Info table, we had 129 visitors this year. Though this was down from our record year last year, it's still a very respectable number and in line with previous years.

At the last board meeting, the board discussed posting the ARRL submission on the PAARA web site. In the coming weeks, give or take, you'll be able to check out the submissions for the past several years. Likely it will be posted in the member area. So, what's up now? Rest and recover for next year. There are already a few discussions on taking a different approach next year than in the past. There is some testing being done in that area but it's too early to consider a direction. You'll have to wait until next year. Until then, get on your radios and hone your phone, CW or digital skills for FD next year. Until then, I know Doug, KG6LWE, would say a GREAT JOB, EVERYONE! Everyone helps make FD the great event PAARA is known for!

November 10, 10:00 A.M.

SS Red Oak Victory is the last surviving vessel of 747 ships of all types that were built at the Richmond Kaiser Shipyards during World War



II. She is also one of the last surviving World War II Victory ships. The Red Oak continues to serve today as a museum ship and as a monument to the thousands of men and women who worked hard to build these ships in a time of national crisis.

These ships, along with their cousins the Liberty ships, were built on an emergency basis to carry vital supplies and troops to all theaters of war. The Victory ships remain today as a symbol of the national resolve and industrial might that won the Second World War.

Aug 15, 2018, Board Meeting Minutes

The meeting was held at Marty's QTH, commencing at 7:26 PM on August 15, 2018. In attendance were Kristen McIntyre, K6WX (Pres), Marty Wayne, W6NEV (VP), Ron Chester, W6AZ (Treasurer) via videoconference, Jim Thielemann, K6SV (Secretary/Membership), Darryl Presley, KI6LDM (Dir), Walter Gyger K6WGY(Dir), and non-board member Clark Martin, KK6ISP, (ASVARO Representative). A quorum was present.

Kristen, (K6WX), opened the meeting with news that in the just-released National Institute of Standards (NIST) 2019 budget, there are plans to shut down the Colorado and Hawaii WWV and WWVH time standard broadcasts. Hams routinely make use of these time and frequency standards to calibrate our equipment. What doesn't seem to be considered by NIST are others who use the standards for research or other uses. She urges members who know of other users or uses of the service to advise the ARRL to lobby for the continuation of this service for both hams and other uses.

Kristen mentioned her reserve of stories is nonexistent, thus there is an urgent need for stories. Please, if you've committed to a story but not submitted it (there are several people out there fitting this category) put pen to paper or fingers on the keyboard and let your creative juices flow! Do you have any projects, Field Day experiences, technical articles, hints n kinks, DX contacts, or experiences setting up your station or antenna, on the air experiences that might be of interest? If you have not previously drafted that story or have a new story, now is the time to get a byline of your own in PAARAgraphs and get that story submitted to Kristen for publication. "Remember it is 'homegrown' stories that make PAARAgraphs great", she said.

Vice President's Report: Marty, W6NEV, announced the September speaker is John Miller, K6MM, who will be presenting on his experiences on the Baker Island KH1/KH7Z DXpedition. It had been 16 years since the last DXpedition to Baker Island. This was also the 1st DXpedition to use FT8 in "DXpedtition Mode". Marty also mentioned that he has speakers booked for the remainder of the year. He's starting to work on next year so please let Marty know of anyone who would be interested in presenting at a PAARA meeting.

Secretary's report: Jim, K6SV, reported that there were 5 new members joining in August. The current membership stands at 195. The current membership is made up of 46% Tech/ General and 54% Amateur Extra/Advanced licensed amateurs.

Treasurer's Report: Ron, W6AZ, provided the board with information on last month's income. Including ad sales and balancing out the Raffle expensed vs income since January. The club's finances remain in good condition.

Under Old Business

Clark, KK6ISP, ASVARO representative, provided the board with the preliminary ASVARO breakdown of the impending invoice. The board discussed various charges on the invoice to try and understand what they are for. The board requested that Clark query ASVARO on several of the charges so we could better understand them and why they might be seemingly so high. The board also voted to not pay the \$100 "rainy day" part of the invoice as ASVARO still has a sizable fund which isn't earmarked for anything. Until ASVARO can produce a current P&L showing the status of the rainy-day fund and all other expenses related to the EFM and the new venue. the board doesn't feel the rainy-day fee is warranted.

The board also discussed that PAARA is the September 8th Flea Market sponsor. Kristen, K6WX, is still looking for volunteers to help during the entire event. This is a great opportunity for you to jump in and assist the club in our one big income source of the year. If you enjoyed everything that PAARA did for Field Day, here is a great opportunity to put some back in the coffers to help cover the expenses for this year's event. Please reach out to Kristen if you wish to help.

Last month the board felt we need a list of activities that need volunteers, thus members would know the areas in which they can help. Clark,

KK6ISP, volunteered to compile a list of volunteer opportunities that members can help the club with. Jim, K6SV, went a little further and created a list of all volunteer activities and indicated who was covering them or if there is a need for someone to fill the position. The list was created to document the efforts of those who volunteer time on behalf of the club and let members know how many things the club does that need someone to assist with to keep the club running. This list will be published in PAAR-Agraphs with the hope members will find something on the list that they can assist PAARA with. Most of the opportunities don't require much time but do require a commitment to accomplish.

Marty, W6NEV, updated the board, on the next field trip which is to the SS Red Oak Victory, the last surviving, out of 747, World War II Victory ships. This will be a drive yourself to Richmond tour of the ship. There are 2 tours one can sign up for, one including the engine room the other not. The tour will also include a box lunch. The field trip will be on November 10th at 10:00 AM. Also, of note, MDARC has been invited to join us. This will give the opportunity for each club to get to know members of the other club and meet at an event other than Pacificon. You can find more about the ship at http://redoakvictory.us/. There was a short follow up conversation regarding the current cost of PAARA badges. This month it was confirmed that the cost of badges from the engraver has gone up higher than the cost PAARA is charging for them. After some discussion, the board voted to increase the badge cost to \$20 starting immediately.

Last month, Marty, W6NEV, mentioned receiving a few QSL cards, mostly from Field Day, but not having any cards to send back. Jim, K6SV, provided the board with a quote to print a small number of cards for both Field Day call signs. The board voted to proceed with having the cards printed.

Last month, Kristen, K6WX, mentioned having written a short story on Field Day for the South Valley Review. I was remiss in not mentioning

that Bob Korte, KD6KYT, was responsible for this opportunity through his work as Bonus Point Captain for Field Day. To date, no one has come forward to pen the next short 200-word story. Please contact Kristen for information on penning the next story.

Last month Jim, K6SV, mentioned that there are a number of openings in the advertising section of PAARAgraphs that could be filled and the existing ad holders needed to be contacted. Holders of existing ad's need to confirm the current ad is still OK. Walt, K6WGY, updated the board on the status of contacting the advertisers and getting any updated ad information and payment. He also mentioned there is no cost in PAARAgraphs for a ¼ page ad. The board voted that a ¼ page ad will sell for \$14/month which is in keeping with the charges on other sized ads.

There are several other items on the agenda that haven't been worked on very much or could wait until the next meeting, thus at this point there is no new news on them.

Under New Business

Marty, W6NEV, mentioned needing volunteers to staff the W1AW/6 special event station at Pacificon. He especially needs overnight operators/assistants. However, he needs help with all activities related to setting up, assisting operators during the event and teardown of the station. The plan is to start the setup of the station late Thursday, October 18th with the goal of having at least one radio online by noon on Friday. Last year they were able to get all 4 stations operational by noon. Teardown starts on Sunday the 21st at noon.

The Board meeting was adjourned at 9:09 PM.

yet, but we are likely to be near or at a prolonged solar minimum for sunspot cycle 24. We don't know if this is predictive for cycle 25 activity. Some solar physicists believe that we are headed toward weaker cycles and something like a Maunder Minimum, a prolonged minimum during the 17th century. Others say that we just don't know and we could have a great cycle 25. We will know a little more in the next few years. In the mean time, as radio operators, we just shift to the lower bands and continue enjoying QSOs around the world.

The fall contest season is around the corner. This is an opportunity to get on the air and practice working stations using your favorite mode. We can look forward to working some amazing contest stations with our modest equipment. They will have great antennas, so this is a chance to get out there portable, QRP, or just from the home station. From now through November we will see many QSO parties, the ARRL DX contest, NAQP, CQWW DX, WPX, ARRL VHF, AA, Sweeps, and of course CQP. 


